A Message From Pastor Carol

Dear Members and Friends,

The apostle John was the youngest of Jesus' twelve disciples. He lived a long life, around 94 years, and died peacefully in Ephesus. Church tradition says that near the end of his life, John was so frail he had to be carried to church in the arms of his disciples. When it was time for him to preach, John's sermon consisted of only five words - "Little children, love one another." In time, his disciples became weary of hearing the same short phrase repeated over and over so they asked, "Master, why do you speak only these words and repeat them so often? John replied, "It is the Lord's command, and if this alone is done, it is enough."

Love one another. It's the command Jesus gave his disciples on the eve of his crucifixion. It's a command that's repeated 16 times in the New Testament. It speaks directly to how we treat one another within the church.

We were never meant to follow Jesus alone. We need Christian community.

The Bible is filled with passages about how we should treat one another. Our summer sermon series will take a look at 12 of these "one another" passages. The one another passages give us a vision of Christian community that is unlike any other type of organization, team or club. Christian community is marked by mutual love, encouragement, prayer, forgiveness. As Christians we're commanded to live in harmony with one another, prefer one another, accept one another, greet one another (with a holy kiss, no less), serve one another and build each other up. We're also told to admonish one another and submit to one another. (Yikes!) These are all ways we live out Jesus' command to love.

I recently asked the congregation how they know if someone loves them. Here are some of the excellent responses. We know a person loves us when they

- Are kind in deeds and speech
- Forgive us
- Stand by us no matter what
- Put us ahead of their own needs
- Pray for us
- Do things for us
- ❖ Take time for us
- Hug us and say I love you!

These are all excellent ways to put Jesus command to love one another into practice. May you rest in God's love today, and may his love flow through you to others.



HIDDEN HARVEST



Putting good food to good use

Where We Come From

It is a simple concept. Don't waste food and if you have extra, get it to people that can use it. It's what our parents taught us. For years HIDDEN HARVEST has done just that. More than 38 million pounds of healthy and nutritious food items have been distributed to hunger relief agencies since 1994.

HIDDEN HARVEST was a "birthday present" from the Saginaw Community Foundation to Saginaw Country. In 1994 The Saginaw Community Foundation was celebrating its tenth anniversary and HIDDEN HARVEST, a surplus food rescue program was organized and initiated. HIDDEN HARVEST was (and still is) the areas only prepared and perishable surplus food rescue program.

Lucy Allen, Past President and CEO of The Saginaw Community Foundation, along with Culli Damuth, and Diane Fong did much of the early brain storming, organizing and fund raising for HIDDEN HARVEST. The Good Neighbors Mission was first home for HIDDEN HARVEST and Carolyn Butler, Executive Director of The Mission, provided the day-to-day supervision of the program.

Start up grants from The Harvey Randall Wickes Foundation, Wickson-Link Foundation, Saginaw Community Foundation and Citizens Bank Trusts helped finance the first three years of HIDDEN HARVEST. The grants allowed the program to purchase a truck with a refrigeration unit and hire a program coordinator.

In 1994, HIDDEN HARVEST began picking up surplus food items from food donors in the Saginaw area. Damores Wholesale Produce, The Frankenmuth Poultry Company, Germain Town and Country Club, Grants-Sysco Foodservice, Leaman's Green Applebarn, McBrite Manor, Montague Inn, Ponderosa Steak House, Ruby Tuesday, Ryan's Family Steak House, Saginaw Club, Saginaw Country Club, Saginaw General Hospital, St. Luke's Hospital, St Marys Medical Center, Super Foods and Treasure Island were some of our original food donors. That first year HIDDEN HARVEST was able to rescue and redistribute 59,852 pounds of surplus food items.

Some of the first recipient agencies were Boysville, East Side Soup Kitchen, Emmaus House, Good Neighbors Mission, Hospital Hospitality House, Innerlink, Mid-Michigan Teen Challenge, Refuge Center Ministries, Restoration Community Outreach, Saginaw City Rescue Mission, The Salvation Army and Underground Railroad.

Your generous Mission giving in the month of July will support the work of Hidden Harvest.
